POLICY 605

ARTICLE 1 AUTHORIZATION

- A. District funded transportation shall be provided as a privilege for students who live an unreasonable and unsafe walking distance from school. The points at which students will be received and delivered shall be determined by the Transportation Director. Students are to ride their assigned bus and be received and discharged at the same point unless permission for change is requested by parents and approved by the Transportation Director or Principal. Students shall be expected to be at bus stops at least five (5) minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive. Drivers will wait for students only for a brief time according to their time schedules and/or if traffic conditions allow.
- B. When a parent or designated adult is not at the place of discharge for an elementary student and the driver determines this to be an unusual or unsafe circumstance the driver shall return the student to the elementary school or to a designated child-care agency. Parents may be responsible for child-care fees charged by the agency.
- C. Transportation shall be provided for special education students whose Individual Educational Program (IEP) requires such service or parents shall be reimbursed at an amount determined by the District for transport of their special education child.
- D. Transportation services may be contracted with other school districts or agencies.
- E. District bus transportation is authorized for District sponsored educational activities and extra-curricular activities. At least one coach or sponsor, in addition to the driver, shall ride each bus to and from the activity to monitor student behavior and to provide supervision. Failure of the school to assign a staff member for this purpose or failure of the assigned coach or sponsor to be present at the scheduled time for departure may result in cancellation of the trip.
- F. District vehicles, other than buses, may be used for transport of students when the numbers do not exceed vehicle capacity. A staff member may be assigned to drive the vehicle when he/she is properly licensed and meets requirements set forth by the Transportation Director.
- G. A staff member may transport a student or group of students (limited to seatbelt capacity of the vehicle) in his/her personal vehicle for school-related purposes only with permission granted by the Principal or Superintendent and filing of a District Transportation Awareness, Consent and Release form signed by at least one of the student's parents or guardians. Permission from the Principal or Superintendent shall only be granted when the staff member has (1) liability insurance coverage in compliance with state law, (2) has provided a copy of his/her driver's license and insurance card, (3) has signed a memo of understanding that his/her personal liability insurance shall be used first for any necessary coverage and (4) a memo of understanding that the District does not accept any responsibility for damage of any kind or theft of the vehicle throughout the duration of the trip.

POLICY 605

- H. The District frequently provides transportation for students to and from school-sponsored activities and events, but is unable to do so on every occasion. Additionally, parents may decide that their student will not use District transportation but be transported to or from a school sponsored activity or event by a private party in a private vehicle (see limitation in paragraph I). When District transportation is not available or parents decide to have their student use alternative transportation, it is the student's parents/guardians responsibility to provide or arrange for their student's transportation to and from the event. The District can not and does not assume any responsibility for the safety of such transportation, training of drivers, condition of vehicles, adequacy of the transportation for the use or purpose intended or any other matters related to any alternative non-district transportation. For students to use alternative, non-District, transportation, the District Transportation Awareness, Consent and Release form must be signed by the student and at least one of the student's parents or guardians before such transportation for a student will be allowed.
- I. Coaches may require team members to ride together on a District bus to and from competitions. However, each coach should be considerate of family needs, circumstances and situations when a parent or guardian requests that his/her son/daughter be transported either to or from the competition in a private vehicle. A parent or guardian who desires his or her student to be transported in a private vehicle to or from school-sponsored activities shall sign and submit the District's Transportation Awareness, Consent and Release form before such private transportation will be permitted.
- J. Use of District vehicles is authorized for staff use for work related activities and travel to conferences. Drivers must be properly licensed and meet requirements set forth by the Transportation Director.
- K. A fleet of buses and other vehicles shall be maintained by the District to meet required transport requirements.
- L. District purchased and maintained vehicles are authorized for facility and grounds maintenance uses and snow removal.
- M. Purchase of vehicles and buses shall be approved by the Board of Education either through budget appropriations or by specific action upon request of the Transportation Director and recommendation of the Superintendent.

POLICY 605

ARTICLE 2 STAFF

- A. A Transportation Director shall be employed to administer transportation services. He/she shall report to the Superintendent of Schools. A job description shall be maintained for the Director whose duties shall include the administration of all transportation services. He/she shall supervise and evaluate District transportation personnel. The Director may contract for repair services requiring special expertise. He/she shall submit annual budget recommendations to the Superintendent, required reports to the Colorado Department of Education, and Reports required by any other state or federal agency. He/she shall maintain an accurate inventory of transportation supplies, equipment buses and vehicles. The Director shall be responsible for the planning of school bus schedules, routes and stops subject to the approval of the Superintendent.
- B. Transportation staff (drivers, mechanics, secretary) shall be employed as determined necessary by the Director and Superintendent, within budget parameters established by the Board of Education. Drivers must hold licenses as required by state and federal laws and regulations. The Transportation Director shall assign routes to drivers. Seniority is to be taken into account in making assignments, but is not to be the only criterion. Job descriptions, including qualifications, for Transportation staff positions shall be on file in the District Personnel Office.
- C. Training of school bus drivers may be conducted by the District or completed by a contracted service. Individuals approved for training shall be compensated according to the Board approved wage schedule.
- D. In-service training of bus drivers shall occur annually with regard to regulations, safe transport of students, student behavior management, parent/community relationships, and drug and alcohol prohibitions and testing.

ARTICLE 3 SAFETY (SEE POLICY 411 BUS CONDUCT)

- A. Transportation vehicle operators shall conform to state and federal laws and regulations regarding training, licensing and other requirements and shall participate in required in-service training programs. Violations, particularly “moving violations” may subject the driver to suspension without pay and to dismissal from employment.

- B. Vehicles shall only be operated when all state and federal standards and regulations governing such operation are met. No bus or other District vehicle shall be operated in an unsafe condition. Regular and special maintenance of buses and other vehicles is to be completed by an authorized mechanic under the direction of the Transportation Director. Maintenance records for each bus and other vehicle are to be kept in the Transportation office.
- C. The use of safety belts in vehicles is mandatory for all personnel using vehicles that are equipped with safety belts. Operators of all District vehicles, except school buses, shall be responsible for ensuring that all passengers use safety belts. The operator shall not begin to move the vehicle until the operator and all passengers are belted or secured in a child restraint system as required by state law.
- D. Each school bus shall have a daily pre-trip inspection performed and recorded on the District approved form by the operator prior to being placed in service. All safety and/or mechanical problems shall be reported to mechanics and the Director. Every request for maintenance will be carefully investigated and necessary action taken. Any school bus driver who fails to make a daily safety and maintenance check of his/her bus may be suspended without pay for a period to be determined by the Transportation Director. A second offense may result in driver dismissal.
- E. Students shall be instructed as to the proper procedures for boarding and exiting from a school bus and as to proper and safe conduct while aboard. Seat assignments may be made by each driver, at her/his discretion to foster safe student conduct on his/her bus.
- F. Drivers/mechanics are prohibited from any alcohol use that could affect performance on the job including use during the four hours before driving, use on the job, having prohibited concentrations of alcohol in their systems and use during eight hours following an accident.
- G. Drivers/mechanics are prohibited from illegal/illicit drug use, use of a controlled substance, or use of prescription medications that may impair driving or performance. A single incident of such use shall result in disciplinary action and may result in dismissal from employment.
- H. Wireless Communications, for purposes of this policy, are defined as any device intended to facilitate communication, including but not limited to cell phones, two-way radios, walkie talkies, palm pilots, beepers, pagers, etc. Violations of the wireless communications requirements listed below may subject the vehicle operator to disciplinary action.
 - 1. Under usual circumstances, use of District owned wireless communication devices shall be allowed when used to assist a vehicle operator and or dispatcher in the necessary communications periodically needed to safely deliver children-home to school, school to school, school to home, and on activity trips. Use of such devices while the bus or vehicle is in motion shall be limited whenever possible.

2. Vehicle operators shall not place or receive communications on any personally owned wireless communication device while passengers are loading or unloading from the vehicle or while the vehicle is in motion.
 3. Vehicle operators shall under no circumstances place or receive communications unrelated to District business while on duty.
- I. Bus stops shall be designed with student safety being the primary consideration. Stops shall be located to comply with state law regarding students' embarking and disembarking on major thoroughfares.

ARTICLE 4 ALCOHOL AND DRUG TESTING

- A. School bus drivers and other personnel who operate a District vehicle requiring a commercial driver's license are subject to a drug and alcohol testing program that fulfills the requirements of federal regulations. District administrators shall adhere to federal regulations in administering the testing program. Drugs and controlled substances are interchangeable and have the same meaning for purposes of this policy. Drugs refer to marijuana, cocaine, opiates, phencyclidine (PCP) and amphetamines including methamphetamines.
- B. Drug tests are to be administered before a driver performs any safety-sensitive functions for the District. Tests will be required of an applicant only after the position has been offered. Employment with the District is conditional upon the applicant receiving a negative drug test result.
- C. Alcohol and controlled substance tests will be conducted as soon after an accident as practicable on any driver who was performing safety sensitive functions with respect to the vehicle if the accident involved loss of human life, or where any person involved in the accident required immediate medical attention away from the scene and the driver received a citation under state or local law for a moving traffic violation arising from the accident or where the vehicle required towing from the scene and the driver received a citation for a moving violation.
- D. No driver involved in an accident may use alcohol for eight hours after the accident or until after undergoing a post-accident alcohol test, whichever occurs first.

- E. Random drug and alcohol tests shall be conducted on a random basis at unannounced times throughout the year. Random tests for alcohol will be conducted just before, during or just after the performance of safety-sensitive functions. Once notified of selection for drug testing, a driver must proceed to a collection site to provide a urine specimen. Drivers will be selected by a scientifically valid random process and each driver will have an equal chance of being tested each time selections are made. The number of bus drivers selected for random testing will be in accordance with federal regulations.
- F. Drug and alcohol test shall be required when a District official has reasonable suspicion that the driver has violated the District's drug or alcohol prohibitions. Reasonable suspicion must be based on specific, contemporaneous, describable observations concerning the driver's appearance, behavior, speech or body odors. The observations may include indications of chronic and withdrawal effects of controlled substances. Alcohol tests will be authorized for reasonable suspicion only if the required observations are made during, just before or just after the period of the workday when the driver must comply with alcohol prohibitions. The District official who makes a finding of reasonable suspicion must make a written record of his/her observations leading to a reasonable suspicion drug test within 24 hours of the observed behavior or before the results of the drug test are released, whichever is earlier.
- G. Return-to-duty drug or alcohol tests shall be conducted when a driver who has violated the District's drug or alcohol prohibition returns to performing safety sensitive duties.
- H. Employees drug and alcohol test results and records will be maintained under strict confidentiality and released only in accordance with law. Upon written request, a driver will receive copies of any records pertaining to the driver's use of drugs or alcohol, including any records pertaining to personal drug or alcohol tests. Records will be made available to a subsequent employer or other identified persons only as expressly requested in writing by the driver.
- I. Each driver will receive educational materials that explain the requirements of the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 49, Part 382, together with a copy of the District's policy for meeting these requirements. Each driver must sign a statement certifying receipt of these materials.
- J. Any driver who refuses to submit to drug and alcohol tests as described in this Article will not be allowed to perform or continue to perform safety-sensitive functions and may have his/her employment terminated.

ARTICLE 5 SPECIAL USE OF SCHOOL BUSES

- A. Use of buses for field trips, excursions and other special activities must be scheduled at least 5 days in advance. Use may not interfere with regularly scheduled trips.
- B. Field trips that are a component of the District's adopted curriculum shall have priority over other special transportation requests except that such trips shall not result in cancellation of scheduled extra-curricular trips.

ARTICLE 6 AUDIO AND VIDEO RECORDING

- A. Audio and/or video recordings of students on school buses are authorized as tools to encourage positive behavior, to discourage conduct code and bus rule violations, and to document discipline incidents when they occur. Cameras may be placed on buses at the discretion of the Transportation Director.
- B. Audio and video recordings will be treated confidentially. Persons unrelated to a disciplinary incident will not be permitted to hear or view bus audio or video recordings. Parents wishing to hear or view recordings related to a disciplinary action taken with regard to their student may do so in the presence of the Transportation Director or another administrator.

ARTICLE 7 STUDENT CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE WHILE TRANSPORTED

- A. Policy 403 (Conduct Code) and Policy 411 (Conduct on Buses) apply to students being transported in any District Vehicle or in any circumstance when a student is being transported to or from an activity or event for which the student is representing the District, or is participating/attending as a Platte Canyon student.

ARTICLE 8 OVERNIGHT VEHICLE PARKING

- A. Buses and other District vehicles shall be parked overnight at the District Transportation facility or at another designated District property location unless the Transportation Director and the Superintendent authorize parking at another location. Such authorization shall only be given when there is a benefit to the District and when additional costs are not incurred.

ARTICLE 9 PROPERTY AND LIABILITY INSURANCE

- A. The District shall secure property and liability insurance for buses, other vehicles, and transportation equipment.

ARTICLE 10 USE OF SCHOOL VEHICLES BY COMMUNITY GROUPS

- A. Buses and vehicles purchased by the District are to be used primarily for school purposes. Taxpayers shall not be expected to subsidize the expense of providing school vehicles or personnel not necessary for District purposes.. However, they may be made available for use by community groups to the extent that such use does not impinge upon, or impair use for School District purposes.
- B. Non-school use of District vehicles shall not be intermingled with student transportation, nor shall it interfere with:
1. Student transportation to, from or between schools.
 2. Student transportation for school activities and functions.
 3. Emergency transportation for students.
 4. Time required for maintenance and service of vehicles.
 5. Provision of standby vehicles for school purposes.
- C. Among community groups that qualify for the use of school vehicles, are those composed of citizens 65 years of age and older. Such groups shall be given special consideration as required by the statute relating to community use of school vehicles.
- D. Only licensed Platte Canyon bus drivers shall be permitted to drive District buses in use by community groups.
- E. The Transportation Director or designees shall be responsible for approving and scheduling the use of school vehicles by community groups. In approving such use, the following will be considered:
1. Insurance coverage must be provided by the users with coverage similar to and limits not less than the insurance coverage which is in effect while the school vehicle is being used for transportation of students and must include the District as a named additional insured.
 2. Travel over roads or distances which are unduly wearing or damaging to the vehicle or for which the vehicle is inappropriate will not be approved.
 3. Use will not be approved if the fuel consumption involved adversely affects the fuel availability for District purposes.

POLICY 605

4. Approval of use will be subject to cancellation in the event of adverse road, weather or other conditions which could reasonably present a danger to passengers, drivers or vehicles or in the event of unexpected or emergency school needs.
 5. A leader of the group must be identified and agree to assume responsibility for collection and remittance to the District of the required reimbursement.
 6. Use will not be approved if it is for partisan political activity, activity promoting or opposing any sectarian views, activity which is potentially disruptive or dangerous or activities which are inappropriate for District participation.
 7. Use will only be approved where the vehicle and service are appropriate to the physical condition of the users.
 8. Use will only be approved where the group requesting such use is open to all persons who may be reasonably and appropriately included in the group.
- E. As permitted by law, all community groups shall be expected to pay the actual costs involved in the use of School District buses or other vehicles including fees established by the Transportation Director, costs such as, but not limited to, alternative transportation in the event of a breakdown, feeding and housing of users, and any costs associated with vandalism. The Transportation Director shall determine fees using a cost per mile based upon driver compensation, fuel and oil costs, insurance and depreciation.
